Brent Staples of the New York Times writes: "Nazism and



the tradition of American white supremacy that is memorialized in monuments throughout the South are the fruit of the same poisonous tree. In this light, the Confederate flag can legitimately be seen as an alternate version of the Nazi emblem."

If you haven't heard the analogy at some point in the last few years, then you've probably been on an extended journey to another planet. It is a documented fact that Nazi Germany sent its armies crashing over its neighbors' borders in an effort to dominate them. The South. contrast. declared by independence and fought a four year long defensive struggle, mostly on its own territory, against armies sent to subjugate it. It seems to me that if you want to find a "Nazi analogy" in America's civil war that you'd have to look north of the Mason Dixon line, not south of it. It was the north that sent its armies across the border to attack its neighbor, not the reverse. This isn't conjecture – it's a matter of historical record. All one needs to do is to look where nearly all the battles were fought – in the South.

"All we ask is to be left alone." Now, I know something about the history of WWII and for the life of me, I cannot remember any Nazi of any rank ever uttering those words between 1933 and 1945.

When I was growing up, the people of the Confederate States were viewed as Americans who made a choice regarding their survival that they believed was correct and well within their purview. Those in the Northern States saw that choice as being wrong and sought to block it. The result was a bloody conflict, the likes of which America has yet to see again.

The only ones who can take us down are ourselves. And we appear to be doing just that right now. We seem to have reached the point where we as Americans no longer care to remember anything about our past.




CHARGE TO THE SONS OF CONFEDERATE VETERANS



HISTORICAL DATES IN FEBRUARY



February 1, 1861...Texas

declares it has seceded from the Union, joining a chorus of southern states in defiance of the north.

<u>February 8, 1861</u>...State troops of Arkansas take the official state arsenal.

February 9, 1861...The seceded southern states form the Confederation appointing former Federal army officer Jefferson Davis of Kentucky as their President.

February 18, 1861...The Confederate States of America reveal their national anthem, "Dixie".

February 6, 1862...Fort Henry, along the Tennessee River in Tennessee, falls to Union forces under the combine efforts of land and naval forces under the direction of General Grant. He then turns his attention eastward towards enemy-held Fort Donelson along the Cumberland River.

February 10, 1862...Confederate forces of the "Mosquito Fleet" fall to elements of the Union Navy near Elizabeth City, North Carolina as part of the Battle of Elizabeth City.

February 13, 1862...Forces under the command of Union General Ulysses S. Grant begin their attack to take Fort Donelson along the Tennessee River.

<u>February</u> 14, 1862...Under heavy and accurate fire, Union Flag Officer Foote's gunboat flotilla are repelled by the guns of Fort Donelson.

February 20, 1862...Union Captain David Farragut arrives outside of New Orleans, Louisiana with his naval forces in tow. He takes up position at Ship Island near Biloxi, Mississippi. This is part of the campaign to retake the strategically important port city.

February 20, 1862...President Lincoln and wife Mary Todd Lincoln suffer the death of their 11 year old son Willie.

February 20, 1862...The Battle of Val Verde begins pitting 3,000 Union troops against 2,590 confederates in New Mexico Territory supported by Texas cavalry as well as land militia forces.

February 28, 1862...The Battle of Island Number Ten (New Madrid, Missouri) begins. Union forces are led by John Pope and Andrew Footer against Confederate foes headed by John McCown and William Mackall.

February 24, 1863...The USS Indianola is grounded by Confederate warships and taken over. The action takes place near Warrenton in Mississippi.

February 2, 1864...The USS Underwriter is claimed and destroyed by Confederate warships in the Neuse River (North Carolina).

February 3, 1864...Union General Sherman begins the Meridian Campaign, the taking of Meridian, Mississippi.

February 9, 1864...From the period of February 9th through the 14th, Union forces continue their march through Florida.

<u>February</u> 14, 1864...General Sherman's force takes Meridian, Mississippi and destroys much of its infrastructure.

February 17, 1864...The CSS Hunley becomes the world's first submarine to sink a surface vessel. The target becomes USS Housatonic in Charleston Harbor. However, CSS Hunley is lost in the action.

February 20, 1864...The Battle of Olustee, Florida. 5,500 Union troops face 5,000 Confederates. The battle is a Confederate victory with 1,861 Union wounded to the South's 946. Commanding officers are Truman Seymour (Union) and Joseph Finnegan (Confederate).

takes place in Chickasaw County,
Mississippi. Confederate forces,
numbering 2,500 under the
leadership of General Forrest, is victorious
against a larger Union contingent of 7,000
under the direction of William Sooy Smith.

February 11, 1865...The Battle of Wilmington (North Carolina) begins between 12,000 Union and 6,000 Confederate troops.

February 15, 1865...Sherman turns his army north to destroy the Carolinas, burning Columbia, S. Carolina to the ground.

February 21, 1865...The Battle of Douglas Landing takes place in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. It is a Confederate victory.





SEIZURE OF THE LITTLE ROCK ARSENAL

The seizure of the Little Rock Arsenal was an event during the secession crisis of 1861. The people of Arkansas were contemplating leaving the Union, and armed volunteer companies from around the state took control of the Federal arsenal from soldiers of the U.S. Army.

The crisis began in November 1860, when Abraham Lincoln was elected president of the United States. During this time of heated debates, the previously unmanned Little Rock Arsenal was garrisoned in November 1860 by sixty-five Federal troops under the command of Captain James Totten. Pro-secessionists in Helena (Phillips County) urged Gov. Henry Rector to seize the arsenal and the weapons it held before more Federal troops could arrive from the Indian Territory. On January 28, Rector informed Totten that neither reinforcements nor the removal destruction of weapons at the arsenal would be permitted. Totten replied that he took his orders from the federal government and not the state of Arkansas. At the same time, the first volunteers from the state began to appear in the city to help seize the arsenal.

On February 6, the governor wrote to Totten and explained that, while he was not in command of the volunteers, he did ask for the garrison to surrender to prevent

possible bloodshed. Totten, who had not received any instructions from his commanders, agreed to the surrender and turned the entire arsenal over to the Capital Guards. On February 8, the militia unit escorted the Federal troops out of the arsenal and to the Arkansas River, where they boarded a steamer bound for St. Louis, Missouri,



THE BATTLE OF VALVERDE

The Battle of Valverde was fought on February 21, 1862, during the American Civil War. On December 20, 1861, Brigadier General Henry H. Sibley issued a proclamation claiming New Mexico for the Confederacy. To support his words, he advanced north from Fort Thorn in February 1862. Following the Rio Grande, intended to take Fort Craig, the capital at Santa Fe, and Fort Union. Marching with 2,590 ill-equipped men, Sibley neared Fort Craig on February 13. Within the fort's walls were around 3,800 Union soldiers led by Colonel Edward Canby. Unsure of the size of the approaching Confederate force, Canby employed the use of wooden "Quaker guns," to make the fort look stronger.

Judging Fort Craig to be too strong to be taken by direct assault, Sibley remained south of the fort and deployed his men with the goal of enticing Canby to attack. Canby departed Fort Craig with the bulk of his command only leaving a force of militia to guard the post.



Sibley sent reinforcements in the form of Colonel Tom Green's 5th Texas Mounted Rifles and elements of the 7th Texas Mounted Rifles. Green authorized

an attack by a company of lancers from the 5th Texas Rifles. Seeing the Union assault forming, Green ordered Major Henry Raguet to lead an attack against the Union's right to buy time.

Canby sent "Kit" Carson's untested 1st New Mexico Volunteers across the river; he advanced them, along with Captain Alexander McRae's artillery battery, to a forward position. Surging forward in three waves, Scurry's men struck near McRae's battery. In fierce fighting, they succeeded in taking the guns and shattering the Union line. His position suddenly collapsing, Canby was forced to order a retreat back across the river though many of his men had already begun to flee the field. THE CSS HUNLEY

The CSS Hunley, was a submarine of the Confederate States of America that played a part in the American Civil War. Hunley demonstrated the advantages and the dangers of undersea warfare. She was the first combat submarine to sink a warship (USS Housatonic)


On 17 February 1864, The *Hunley* attacked and sank the 1,240-displacement ton United States Navy screw sloop-of-war *Housatonic*, which had been on Union blockade-duty in Charleston's outer harbor. *Hunley* did not survive the attack and also sank, taking with her all eight members of her third crew, and was lost.

Finally located in 1995, *Hunley* was raised in 2000, and is on display in North Charleston, South Carolina, at the Warren Lasch Conservation Center on the Cooper River.

The CSS Hunley is now located at the Warren Lasch Conservation Center (on the old Charleston Navy Base) North Charleston, South Carolina.

The Crystal Theatre was opened on January 1, 1925 at 220 W. Tyler Street, Gilmer, Tx. by Rosa Croley launching with the film "The Mask of Lopez" starring Fred Thomson. Not long after, Cranfill H. Cox bought the theatre operating it for the next 40 years. The downtown theatre proved flexible moving from silent film to sound initially with the DeForrest Phonofilm system to talkies to 3D films to widescreen presentations.

On July 23, 1965, just months after celebrating its 40th anniversary, the theatre burned down hours after the final showings of Disney's "Savage Sam" and "Monkey's Uncle". The remaining wall of the Crystal Theatre was torn down.
